The Ocean Glow at Matai

Did you know the Marlborough Sounds' waters can be just as bright at night as they are in the midday sun? Phosphorescence in the water makes a trail of lights that is quite mesmerizing. It is not uncommon to see this phenomenon in the sounds after hours.


It is the result of the bioluminescence of organisms in the surface layers of the sea. Much like fireflies flitting through the air, the algae (of a wide variety of species) emit a glow whenever they are jostled.

The luminescence of these organisms is stimulated by movement or when they collide with each other. Fish swimming around and boats moving can spark the phosphorescence, and from a practical point of view it can be useful for fishing at night as it helps detect concentrations of fish.

To create a bit of magic for the kids, you can make the glow yourself by lying on a jetty and running your hands through the water, or going for a night swim. They will talk about it for weeks! Do you have any images of the ocean's glow in the Marlborough Sounds? If so, we would love to see them!

Opium, War, and Slavery: The HMS Pelorus

July 1808, the Napoleonic War was at its height. Emperor Napoleon controlled most of Europe and recent battles had left only Britain and Sweden opposing him.

The British Royal Navy, in desperate need of ships, began mass producing the economic 18-gun Cruiser Class brig-sloop. One such sloop was the seemingly

insignificant HMS Pelorus.

Built in Itchenor, England - the **HMS** Pelorus was commissioned under Commander James William King. With the war going, it wasn't long before the Pelorus got its first taste of combat. In February 1809, the ship took part in the invasion of The Martinique. battle significantly crippled French power in the Caribbean.



In a funny twist, command of the Pelorus had been transferred to Commander Thomas Huskisson a month earlier. However, a miscommunication meant that Huskisson didn't learn of this until May, long after the Invasion of Martinique. Thankfully, things were sorted, and he was in command during the blockade of the nearby Guadeloupe a year later.

The Pelorus spent the rest of the Napoleonic War patrolling the Caribbean, capturing French and American privateers. During this time command transferred through multiple commanders including Joshua Rowley. Command continued to transfer after the war ended, with the Pelorus preforming several duties including protecting British trade ships and capturing smugglers.

In September 1831, command of the Pelorus was transferred to Captain Richard Meredith as part of the West Africa Squadron. They patrolled Africa, suppressing the slave trade. During this time, Pelorus rescued over 1300 people from Spanish slavers. Her most notable feet was capturing the Minerva in 1835 without suffering any casualties, freeing 676 slaves in the process.

As the end of the decade neared, command of the Pelorus was transferred yet again. Captain Francis Harding took command on the 31 January 1837 and she sailed for Australia, assisting in the fight against rebels in both India and the Indian Ocean. One year later, in 1838, she sailed for New Zealand; having been tasked with surveying the Marlborough region.

In another twist, Pelorus was not under Harding's command during the survey. Due to illness, he transferred command to Lieutenant Phillip Chetwode (after whom the Chetwode Islands are named). Guided by whaler John Guard, the Pelorus entered the sound using the narrow pass between Forsyth Island and the Mainland.

For eight days, the Pelorus sailed through and surveyed the sound. During this time John Guard told Chetwode of a large navigable river, known by the natives as Te Hoeire. By the end of the survey, both the river and the sound were named Pelorus in honour of the ship.

Sadly, things did not go well for Pelorus after the survey was complete. On 25 November 1939, under the command of Augustus Leopold Kuper, the Pelorus was hit by hurricane winds while anchored off Port Essington in Australia. The storm killed 12 crewmen and left the ship in nine feet of mud for 86 days. After repairs were complete in July 1840, the Pelorus sailed for Singapore, and took part in the First Opium War.



Thirty-two years of war and service had begun to take their toll on Pelorus. On October 16, 1841, the Admiralty ordered the ship be sold. She was bought by the Pybus Brothers, in 1842, who used her for trading opium under the command of Captain Triggs.

However, this new role was short lived. On Christmas Day, 1844, the Pelorus struck a shoal in the South

China sea (just of the coast of Borneo). Captain Triggs was able to reach Singapore (160 km away), using the Pelorus' gig, and bring back help. Although unable to save the Pelorus, his saved 20 crew members (along with 70 chests of Opium).

It is unknown what became of the Pelorus after the wreck. However, its memory lives on in the Marlborough region as the name sake of both the Pelorus River and the Pelorus Sound, home of the Matai Bay Hut.
