# Matai Hut History – a recap

The Matai Bay hut was originally built out of concern for the native bush being destroyed by noxious animals, mainly deer and opossums.

In 1962, the New Zealand Forest Service was tasked with looking into eradication measures by the Croisilles/French Pass/Durville Island Reserves board. Two years later, the Forest Service requested that a noxious animal control be implemented in the Duncan Bay Reserve. However, the section holders of Duncan Bay raised a total of 27 objections in response to the proposal. While the Reserve Board supported the need for the base, it agreed with the section holders that the Duncan Bay Reserve was an unsuitable location. The Reserves Board instead proposed basing the animal control in Matai Bay.


Four years later, the Reserves Board organised the construction of a hut to assist the "hunters and opossum trappers.' The building of the Tennyson Inlet Hut (as it would be named) was undertaken by Thorn and Hart. Construction was funded via a Government grant of \$610.00 (\$10,000 today). Building materials were punted across from Havelock by Eric Johnson and Sons for the sum of \$18.00 (\$300 today)(Ref. Minutes of Reserves board meetings).



Over the years the hut has gone through a number of changes as its usage has become more and more recreational. A major upgrade by the Maritime Parks Board occurred in the mid 1970s due to increasing public demand for park access. The hut is believed to have been rebuilt during this upgrade, during which it was moved closer to the sea. Anecdotes of the original hut describe it as " a scummy, hunter's tin hut with a smelly smoky open fire".

Although the original hut offered little in the way of comfy sleep (with many preferring to sleep on their boats) it did offer some fantastic whitebaiting from the local creek. If anyone has any information or anecdotes from the early days we would love to hear.

# Matai Hut after the Floods of August 2022

After four days of rain and emptying 750mm from the home rain gauge we were anxious to check out the Matai Bay hut. Then Finally on Saturday the rain stopped, and we headed out of Penzance through the muddy waters.



Choosing the deepest beach landing we tied the boat up on the shore in from the Matai Hut mooring and walked up through the toe toe to cross the creek to the hut, the creek had turned into a raging river totally impossible to cross. We motored over to the beach in front of the hut all good. The hut was surrounded by mud, tentatively we pushed opened the door to find the

interior beautifully clean and dry, what a joy. Walking through the bush to the Nikau gully up where the creek bends, we could see it had overflowed through the bush and down under the hut sweeping everything clear, but fortunately the banks had held directing the main force of the creek way from the hut. The flood claimed a few trees on the edge of the creek, there is some debris strewn around and plenty of mud but thats about it.

Leaving the bay we had a chance to observe the effect on the surrounding area, its devastating how many landfalls have scared the hills especially along the western side of the bay, fortunately in time they will regenerate. Already the shags had returned to their old nesting place in the beech trees preparing their new nests for the spring and one of the resident seals had reclaimed his spot on the point, normality was already beginning to return

Our hut situation is very fortunate in comparison to the heart-breaking stories from around the rest of the Marlborough Sounds


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The quality of images is paramount, but the subject is up to your imagination, if it's about the Marlborough Sounds.
